Graham 2029 Vision Goals



Goal 1: Develop alternatives to foster care that eliminate harm

- Develop new models for supporting families in crisis or when poverty is the main risk factor, so children can remain with their families whenever possible
- Develop models for supporting families outside of ACS when parental life circumstances and/or unsafe situations require children to be in out-of-home care
- Advocate for changes in child welfare policies that contribute to harm

Goal 2: In partnership with community, provide support for family wellbeing

- Build vibrant stand-alone community centers that provide trusted help and resources
- Sustain coaching of community leaders in Hunts Point, and expand this approach to more communities

Goal 3: Help youth and parents lead healthy and prosperous lives

- More than double SLAM from roughly 400 to 900 youth
- Expand Scholars of Service to reach over 200 youth, ages 12 to 21, per year through in-house internships
- Help young adults reach a living wage career path by 26 by establishing and sustaining employer partnerships
- Expand employment and entrepreneurial supports for parents
- Expand access to mental health therapy for children and young adults through Graham's centers
- Centralize resources for affordable housing and essential needs
- Advocate for government funding for cash assistance for families

Goal 4: Further advance our thriving One Graham culture

- Conduct advocacy and raise funds so that all staff are paid a living wage
- Renovate centers and offices to continue to create a consistent brand that is warm, welcoming, and healing
- Continue to develop a team of staff and foster parents that respects and reflects our youth's and families' identities
- Provide excellent trauma-informed and equitable supports and services that prioritize families
- Invest in leadership development, staff proficiency in practice models, technology, our administrative team, and fundraising capacity
- Continue our work to combat anti-Black racism and toward becoming an anti-racist, multicultural organization
- Expand support of businesses run by women, people of color and people who live in the communities we support
- Enhance innovation capacity (e.g. through an innovation lab) to develop, scale, and sustain change
